Cayuga Tribal Report of the Hunger Moon

The Cayugas have a lot to talk about and not much birch bark to do it in without causing an environmental crisis. We have been to the borderlands of southern Michigan at the gathering of the mighty tribes of the Livonia Federation for the Winter campout at the magnificent Storer Camp. The cold heart of winter didn't chill the appetites of the braves for ice bowling, broom ball, and skating on a windswept and bone chilling Stony Lake. We rode the wild stallions (in straight lines) and practiced the ancient arts of candle making and Perler bead

mosaics. We made not-too-recognizable objects from the three things we brought with us to the Dutch auction and made giant braves out of small braves by layering. We ate well, we slept well, we chanted well, and we had a lot of father and son fun! Then...

The Cayugas saw how the daily birch bark that ends up in your driveway or on your doorstep or at your news stand gets printed. On the 25th day of the Snow Moon, Wild Fish and Running Hawk arranged a visit to the new Ann Arbor News printing facility just south of Ann Arbor off of State Street. In this one year old facility, we saw two giant printing presses capable of making 40,000 papers every hour. We saw the plate room where the stainless steel plates are etched and we learned about the soy based ink and



water that is applied to the plates and transferred to the paper. We saw a mountain of birch bark that was called a thirty day supply of paper and we were shown the plant's color ink tanks and water tanks. We were taken through the press control room and then saw a completely different room where papers come off the presses on conveyer belts and are layered into big rolls with steel bands to be stored until they are ready to be "stuffed" with flyers. We saw the machines that did the flyer stuffing, the stacking and banding of the finished papers, and we were tempted to

pull our car up to the end of a conveyer belt to be loaded with papers. We were amazed and after all that we were fed too. Our minds and our tummies were fed with a lot of good stuff and that made us really happy with all the father and son fun we had had. But, that wasn't all...

The Cayugas took yet another venture out into our amazing world to see what keeps the giant silver birds flying. Howling Coyote and Soaring Hawk arranged a tour of the Northwest Airlines maintenance facility at Metro Airport on the fourth day of the Hunger Moon. We learned that there are over 40 Northwest airplanes that are worked on in Detroit every night while we sleep. The hanger that we were in had two DC-9s and a 747 in it for various maintenance activities while the snow flurries swirled around outside. We were shown the spare engines for DC-9s, Airbus A319s, and 747s. The young braves each had the opportunity to sit in the cockpit of a DC9.

The main attraction that piqued all the braves interest, though, was the 747 called "The City of De-

troit." Our class started in the right wheel well where we learned about fuel tanks and landing gear. Then we went up three flights of maintenance stand stairs just to get to the door of "The City of Detroit." We were taken to the tail of the aircraft, which was outside the hanger door, and saw where the flight attendants sleep upstairs on those 14 hour flights while the "black boxes" are busy taking flight data next to the snoozing attendants. All the way up front and upstairs each boy got a front row seat lesson in many of the features of the 747-400's "glass" cockpit and a number of the braves sampled many of the



amenities of Business Class seats. We were shown a spare 747 engine and given an explanation of the principles that enables this giant to lift off the ground at about 750,000 pounds.

With our minds swimming through all the amazing facts, our clocks jumped ahead two hours and we realized that we had a real world and a school day the next day to get back to. We couldn't pass on a snack and a recap of the evening, though. These will be some father and son memories we will all be packing away "forever."
