
Crow Tribal Report








Cayuga Tribal Report of the Mad Moon

The Cayuga tribal meeting of the Falling Leaf moon gave us a sampling of the fun you can have with nature's harvest. On day 20 our ponies took us to where no Cayuga had gone before. We spent the afternoon at Westview Orchards somewhere out near Romeo. The main goal of our expedition become clear as our heavy duty hayride wagon rounded the rising, rolling rut in the rugged road when Proud Eagle let it be known that things were looking pretty corny out there!

We entered the Lady Liberty Corn Maze shortly after that and found that Cayugas are outstanding in the field (as the picture below shows) even when it comes to finding check points and getting out of the field. When the tribe was reassembled and well exercised we rode back once again on rolling bails of straw to go play in the straw mountain, stagger through the "Black Hole" and indoor maze, see animal life up close in the petting pens, and sample the fruits of the apple harvest that Rapid River and Cave Finder generously provided from the Cider Mill. Big Eagle demonstrated one of the true pleasures in life, dunking donuts in apple cider, and found a new convert. Straight Arrow and Talking Rock had so much fun they couldn't stay awake the whole ride home.



Cayugas Outstanding in the Field



Early in its cycle the Cayuga minds came under the influence of the Mad moon as we wondered if you can make energy from the light of that silvery disk. In an effort to try and satisfy our curiosity we visited the Uni-Solar plant in Auburn Hills on the 2nd day of the Mad moon. We learned about what solar cells are and that they convert light into electrical energy. We saw several different kinds of solar cell arrays and the best places to install them so they can make energy. We then went into the plant and looked at the machines and people that make solar cells. There was a big washer that cleans stainless steel that is a little thicker than aluminum foil. We saw the vacuum chamber (see photo) that is about as long as a football field where the amorphous silicon that makes up the solar cells is deposited on the stainless steel. We saw Indium-Tin-Oxide coating machines, machines that cut the new cells up into usable products, and solar cell testing machines. Our time ran out before we could see everything we came to see and ask all of our questions. We did have time to pass out snacks for the ride home, a time honored tradition no Cayuga will let slip into obscurity.
