The hours of Sunday morning on campout weekends that are less than Talking Rock's ripe age of six have afforded me the unprecedented opportunity to think about the Cayuga Tribal report. This is because Talking Rock, like a good Pokeman trainer, has graciously chosen me to assist in his call to nature in unfamiliar surroundings after which excitement I am left sleepless the rest of the star filled morning. In the Cayuga tribe we now call this natural process "Going to Germany" because of its inher-



ent association with "You're a peein'" (European) heritage, as Rapid River pointed out to us this weekend. This is where the flow of this next Cayuga Tribal report has its origin.

The Cayuga dads met on an evening when the Hunting Moon was at its best in search of ideas to make this the best year in Cayuga Tribal history. We sought inspiration from each other, and savored that inspiration over a pitcher whose contents created amber waves of grain in the pouring, as Wild Fish so eloquently noted. And so we placed the golden touch on our plans for a really great year and are ready to rock!

The Fall Campout is a weekend of transformations. The leaves are starting to turn and when you hop in the car to take off with the boys we all transform too. I transform from the dad who so often has to be the enforcer in the household to the dad who the boys can actually have a fun time with. The boys seem to transform from skilled whiners to listeners who want to have some fun. It's a weekend where real dads abound, where you see Father and son pairs, sometime threesomes, and in one case a self-proclaimed gang. You look around and realize that these are all dads who care, a place where a young voice shouts "Dad!" and all adult heads turn. It is that three-letter word that these men are about.
